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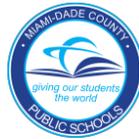
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Inferences and Conclusions from Data

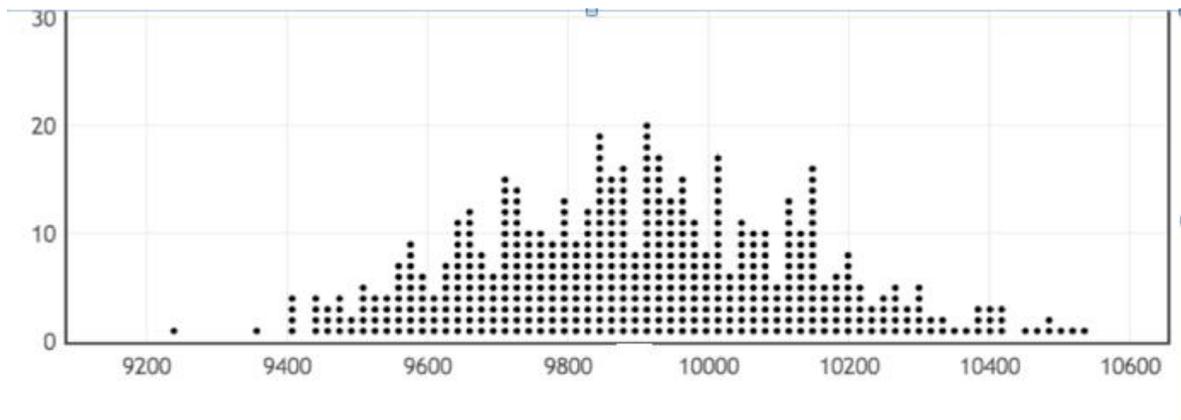
Task 1

1. The distribution of cholesterol levels in teenage boys is approximately normal with $\mu = 170$ and $\sigma = 30$. A random sample of 30 boys in your community has a sample mean cholesterol level = 190.

Use the applet at <http://www.rossmanchance.com/applets/SampleMeans/SampleMeans.html> to design and perform a hypothesis test to see if the boys in our community have an especially high cholesterol level.

Task 2

According to the website, <http://infovis.kitware.com/hospital-costs/>, the mean charge for treating pneumonia at a Maryland hospital is $\mu = \$9,886.98$ with a standard deviation $\sigma = \$1662.80$. You have examined the 15 hospitals closest to you and found a sample mean cost of treating pneumonia of $\bar{x} = \$10,400$. A simulation was run and 500 samples of size 15 were generated. The results are shown in the graph below.



- If the true mean cost of treatment for pneumonia in Maryland hospitals is \$9886.98, how likely is it that we will get a sample mean of \$10,400 or higher? Justify your answer.
- Do you have any concerns about the procedures used here?

Task 3

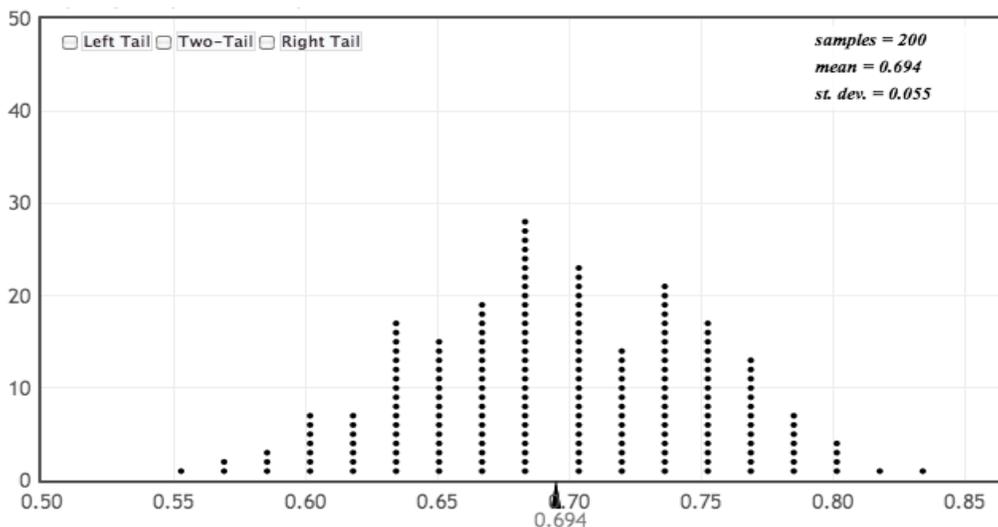
Before first period one day last week Jase surveyed 200 students of the 1300 in his school to determine how many times they had been late to school. He found that 17 of surveyed students had been late at least 5 times. With this sample data, he found a 95% confidence interval of (0.04635, 0.12365) and concluded that no more than 12.365% of the student body will be late 5 or more times.

Which of the following are concerns about Jase's survey? Check all that apply and give a reason for each.

- Jase's sample size is too small.
- Jase only surveyed students on one day.
- Jase only surveyed students who were at school before 1st period.
- Jase constructed a confidence interval on a sample that may not be representative.
- Jase is misinterpreting his confidence interval to indicate that any percentage beyond 12.365% is not possible.
- Jase's confidence interval has been calculated incorrectly

Task 4

A national fast food chain has stated that 70% of their customers order a combo meal instead of ordering individual items. Your local restaurant found that 80% of customers order the combo meal. A 200-trial simulation was run with the assumption that 70% of customers order a combo meal. The results of the simulation are shown in the dot plot below.



- a. According to the simulation, how likely is the occurrence that at least 80% of the customers purchase combo meals?
- b. What (if anything) does this suggest about the national percentage of customers who buy combo meals?

Probability of Compound Events

Task 1

Far Flight High School has 162 students enrolled in French, 294 students enrolled in Spanish, and 78 students taking both languages. The remaining 132 students do not take a language. Find each of the probabilities below and use appropriate notation to summarize the event.

- What is the probability that a student takes French or Spanish or both?
- What is the probability that a student takes French and Spanish?
- What is the probability that a student does not take French?
- How would you describe the students you would include if you were considering the complement of $P(\text{French} \cap \text{Spanish})$? What is the probability of this occurring?

Task 2

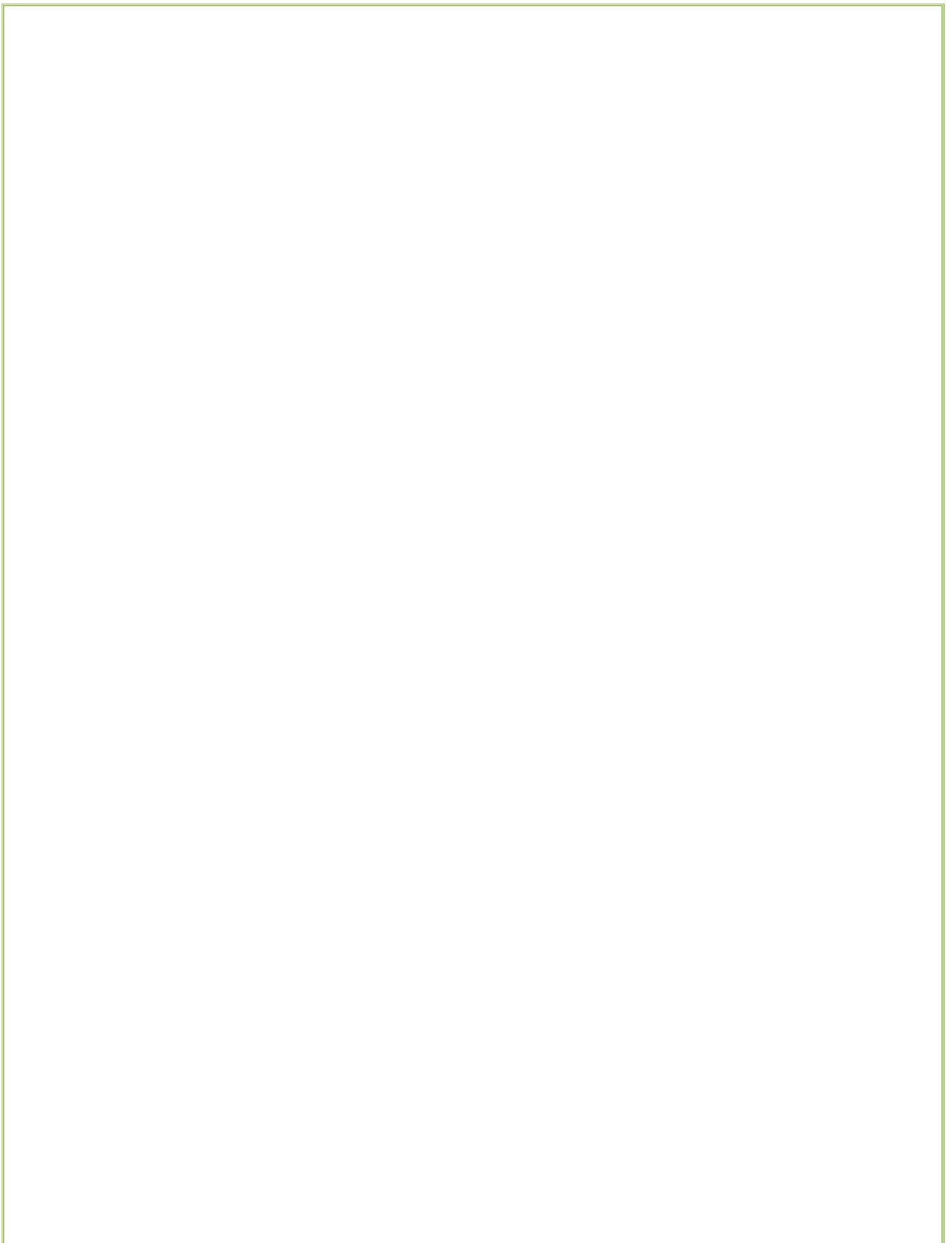

Twenty-five people watched a movie showing at the AMC Theater. Of them, fifteen order a drink, ten order popcorn, and nine order candy. Two people order all three items, one orders a drink and candy, three order a drink and popcorn, and one orders popcorn and candy.

- Display the results in a Venn diagram.
- What is the probability that a moviegoer who buys a drink will also buy popcorn?

Task 3

The Bar Harbor Boating Company in Maine offers 3 boating tours: Just Whale Sightings, Just Puffin Sightings, and Whale and Puffin Sightings. The manager would like to guarantee the sighting of whales and/or puffins on all of the tours or he would give his customers a full refund, however, he is worried he might lose too much money. If the proportion of sighting only a whale is 0.75, the proportion of sighting only a puffin is 0.95, and the proportion of sighting a whale and puffin is 0.72, set up a two-way table. Then, use what you know about calculating probability to make a recommendation to the manager whether or not he should guarantee sightings for each tour. Include a two-way table to support your recommendation.



Non-Discrimination Policy

The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida adheres to a policy of nondiscrimination in employment and educational programs/activities and strives affirmatively to provide equal opportunity for all as required by:

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 - prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, or national origin.

Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended - prohibits discrimination in employment on the basis of race, color, religion, gender, or national origin.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 - prohibits discrimination on the basis of gender.

Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967 (ADEA) as amended - prohibits discrimination on the basis of age with respect to individuals who are at least 40.

The Equal Pay Act of 1963 as amended - prohibits gender discrimination in payment of wages to women and men performing substantially equal work in the same establishment.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 - prohibits discrimination against the disabled.

Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) - prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in employment, public service, public accommodations and telecommunications.

The Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) - requires covered employers to provide up to 12 weeks of unpaid, job-protected leave to "eligible" employees for certain family and medical reasons.

The Pregnancy Discrimination Act of 1978 - prohibits discrimination in employment on the basis of pregnancy, childbirth, or related medical conditions.

Florida Educational Equity Act (FEEA) - prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, gender, national origin, marital status, or handicap against a student or employee.

Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992 - secures for all individuals within the state freedom from discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, handicap, or marital status.

Title II of the Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2008 (GINA) - Prohibits discrimination against employees or applicants because of genetic information.
Veterans are provided re-employment rights in accordance with P.L. 93-508 (Federal Law) and Section 295.07 (Florida Statutes), which stipulate categorical preferences for employment.

In Addition:

School Board Policies 1362, 3362, 4362, and 5517 - Prohibit harassment and/or discrimination against students, employees, or applicants on the basis of sex, race, color, ethnic or national origin, religion, marital status, disability, genetic information, age, political beliefs, sexual orientation, gender, gender identification, social and family background, linguistic preference, pregnancy, and any other legally prohibited basis. Retaliation for engaging in a protected activity is also prohibited.
